I am very excited about the September club meeting. We should finalize our club shirt order, discuss buying silicon pint glasses, decide club bar upgrades, go over details for the Monster Brew at King Harbor Brewing Co. on September 27th, and have a commercial tasting led by Jeff Sanders. Also, <u>LA Beer Week</u> is this month running from the 20th to the 28th. Please come to the meeting ready to discuss and potentially vote on these topics.

The Monster Brew at King Harbor Brewing Co. should be a great experience for everyone to learn from a brewing session on a commercial system and take home 5 gallons of wort, all for about the same price as if we did all the work. After the April meeting at King Harbor, I am excited to see Master Brewer Phil McDaniel at work. Phil will be making a dark wort at about 20 Plato or 1.080 OG. The wort will be moderately fermentable with caramel and chocolate notes and fairly versatile. The brew session will start at 9AM with the tasting room open and a food truck on hand for lunch. Wort should be ready around 2PM and if you can't attend the brew session, you can still purchase wort. Be sure sign up now if you are coming to the Monster Brew, because after September 15th registration will be opened to other homebrew clubs.

With September starting I have a new kindergartener in the house and I know I am not the only one in the club with kids heading back to school. With my Dregs article already late I decided to brew a quick batch of beer over the Labor Day weekend to celebrate the start of school and the long weekend. I was

also excited to use the WLP540 yeast I picked up at South Bay Brewing Supply. My morning brew session was going smoothly as I was already lautering at 9AM when I stepped inside for a moment and heard a crash. This was quite possibly the most epic failure I have ever experienced brewing. All was not lost, since I had collected at least 4 gallons of wort. I topped off my brew kettle with some water and dried malt extract (DME) and brewed 5 gallons of beer instead of 10. Fate will likely dictate that this is either the best beer I have ever made so I am haunted by the irreproducibility of it, or the worst beer for obvious reasons.

Generally useful books I've enjoyed recently are Brew Like a Pro by Dave Miller, The Homebrewer's Guide to Vintage Beer by Ron Pattinson and his truly awesome website barclayperkins.blogspot.com, and The Homebrewer's Answer Book by Ashton Lewis. Some fascinating books that are a little more obscure are Troubleshooting Methodology for Homebrew by Jason Johnson, Tripel Rock Brewery Manual by Teri Fahrendorf, and The Barbarian's Beverage by Max Nelson.

Three friends and I have gone to eight of Stone's 18 Anniversary Fests. This year was their biggest yet with 200 beers spread over five serving areas on the Cal State San Marcos campus. The biggest change was 15 beers for your \$45 instead of 10 as was the first 16 years. After the fest we always have lunch and enjoy the 50 taps at Churchill's in San Marcos.

One in our group likes lawnmower beer and cider, another brown/porter/stout and the third and I appreciate Pale/IPA and Belgian ales. We planned ahead to share tastings and maximize variety. It was hot but felt less crowded at Sat's 11AM-2PM session than previous years. The lines were shorter anyway. Standout beers for us were:

Sculpin with grapefruit, as if more could fit in

Bear Republic Café Racer 15;

Stone's Tiger Cub Saison, barrel aged w sour cherries:

Ommegamg/d'Achouffe Gnomegang; Heretic Evil Cousin West Coast Double IPA; Jolly Pumpkin/Anchorage Calabaza Boreal; Julian Apple Pie Cider;

Kern River Shuttle Bunny White IPA; Mission Cortez Gold Belgium Blonde;

S. Nevada/Russian River Yvan the Great Belgian Blond;

Smog City Black Current Saison; Societe Harlot Belgian Extra; Beachwood Hop Ninja; and Ska Buster Nut Brown Ale.

Our B/P/S fan was disappointed that only one of his choices was a pick of the litter and all of the many coconut beers he tried were lame.

The longest line was for Pliny, but why? The people watching was excellent as always.

At Churchill's, we had Blind Pig, Arcana Newton's Cider, Rip Current's Going to Church, Firestone's Easy Jack, Bell's Oarsman, and St Louis Kriek for dessert. Oh, and some not so generic food to wash down the beer. Mine was a Shredded Duck Confit BLT with garlic aioli, apple wood smoked bacon, spring mix and heirloom tomato on potato bread.

Great trip all in all.

What's the Brew Law Law

On August 21st, Governor Jerry Brown signed into law <u>AB 2609</u>, which will go into effect on January 1, 2015. This legislation will make the Southern California Homebrewers Festival (SCHF) a legal event. It will also make legal the 2015 American Homebrewers Association National Homebrewers Conference scheduled to take place June 11th through June 13th in San Diego.

AB 2609 revises California law to allow a non profit organization established for the purpose of promoting home production of beer, which would include a home brewers club, to serve beer at fundraising events conducted solely for the benefit of the organization. However, there are several restrictions that apply. For home brewers clubs like the Strand Brewers Club, these restrictions are as follows:

- 1. The beer that is served must be donated by home brewers.
- 2. A home brewers club can have no more than two permitted events per calendar year. Permits must be obtained from the California Department of Alcoholic Beverage Control (ABC).
- 3. The home brewers club must display a printed notice at the event stating the home brewed beer is not a regulated product subject to health and safety standards.
- 4. The event must have an educational component that includes instruction on the history, nature, values, characteristics, and methods of presenting and serving beer.
- 5. Only bona fide members of the home brewers club may attend the event.
- 6. The home brewers club shall not solicit or sign up individuals to be members of the home brew club at the event.
- 7. If more than 50 members are expected to be at the event, the home brewers club must provide the ABC with the number of members that have registered for the event and the estimated number that will be attending, 48 hours before the event.

We were doing fine until restriction numbers 5 and 6. The revised law does not allow home brewers clubs to serve home brew to the

general public at their own fundraising events, nor to recruit new members at these events.

At the beginning of this year, California law was changed to allow home brewers to serve donated home brew to the public at fundraising events for non profit organizations, as long as the non profit organizations were not established for the purpose of promoting home production of beer. AB 2609 did not affect that part of the law.

Clearly, AB 2609 was tailored to accommodate events like the SCHF and the AHA National Conference. It may not be very useful for home brewers clubs like the Strand Brewers Club.


